Free Vision Screenings ID Problems in Young Children

Myles Barthlow's parents had no idea their then-2-year old son had a problem with his vision. Two years ago, Myles participated in a free vision screening conducted by the Troy Community Lions at a Troy Fire Department open house. His father, Joel Barthlow, is a former volunteer firefighter. The results of the screening indicated that Myles and his family should follow up with an eye care professional. They did so and learned that the youngster was legally blind in one eye, which had not been detected before.

Since the problem was caught early, he received appropriate treatment and his vision in that eye has improved to 20/70. He will probably always need to wear glasses or contacts, but through early intervention, his vision in that eye was saved. "We were very fortunate," said Joel Barthlow. "With aggressive patching, he will not have long-term effects from his lazy eye. The free test from the Lions Club saved his right eye. He'll probably always need a contact lens or glasses for that eye. The doctor, a pediatric ophthalmologist, said it was vital to catch it while he was young because once he gets to a certain age, there's no regenerating."

In support of Project Kidsight, Troy Community Lions first offered free screenings two years ago for children over the age of six months at one fire station during a Troy Fire Department open house. The program expanded to three fire stations during the October 8 open house this year. With a digital camera that photographs a child's eye, Troy Community Lions volunteers completed screenings for 160 children this year. Of those, 19 were referred to an eye care professional. Last month, the Troy Community Lions received the Distinguished Service Award from the Lions District Offices for their screenings as part of Project Kidsight.

"It's so popular and requested (that) it expanded to three stations," said Kay Pomeroy, Project Kidsight coordinator for the Troy Community Lions. The Lions also offered screenings at the Troy Police Department open house in May.

The camera is able to detect a number of conditions, differences in eye strength, blurred vision, farsightedness, nearsightedness, asymmetric vision and unequal pupils. "There is no touching the child's eye," Pomeroy said. "The camera is very sophisticated. It takes a picture of the pupil. The camera operator asks the child to look at the clown nose on the camera. It will do a pass-fail." Parents receive a sheet printed with a code they can take to the eye care professional.

Troy Community Lions member Jim Quinn worked the camera at Station 4 this year. He said that one family brought their three children in for screening. "Two of them wore eye glasses after they discovered at the screening last year that they needed to follow up. The parents are always grateful. It's a nice, good thing to do," he said. "We get instant feedback and interact directly with the people who benefit. The camera does all of the hard work for us."

In a prepared statement, Dr. Ed Cordes, optometrist and Chair of the Lions Project Kidsight USA, said that

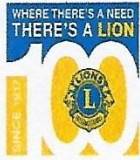
“experts say that up to 80 per cent of learning is visual, so we need to screen all children to identify any vision issues that can get in the way of learning. And we need to screen children early to identify vision problems while they can still be corrected.”

According to the Lions Clubs International, “unless vision problems are detected early and corrected, they risk becoming permanent by age 7.” According to the group’s website, “since 1917, Lions clubs have aided the blind and visually impaired, championed youth initiatives, and strengthened local communities through hands-on service and humanitarian projects.”

Diabetes is at epidemic proportions World-Wide. FACTS

- 422 Million People World-Wide Have Diabetes and 50% may not know they have it
- Since 1988, the number of adults with Diabetes Quadrupled
- The US population is 325 million; 38.3 million (11%) have diabetes and 27.8% are undiagnosed
- 10% of Michigan’s 9.95 million population have diabetes
- 26% of Michigan’s population live in Macomb, Monroe, Oakland and Wayne Counties, where socio-economic factors attribute to higher diabetes numbers

RISK FACTORS

- Smoking
- High Blood Pressure and High Cholesterol
- Lack of Aerobic Exercise
- Overweight

COMPLICATIONS

- Hospitalizations
- Strokes and Cardiovascular Incidents
- Lower Extremity Amputations

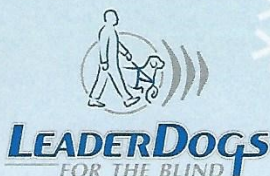

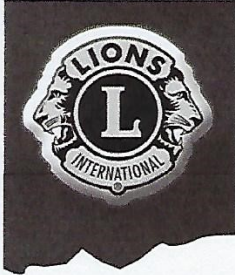

Scholarship Criteria:

1. Must be legally blind and provide verification (letter from optometrist or ophthalmologist or letter from vocational counselor).
2. Applicants must be a resident of the State of Michigan and a United States Citizen (International students must provide proof of citizenship) and either attending or accepted by an accredited trade or business school, college or university.
3. Applicants must complete the official scholarship application (both sides).
4. Must submit two letters of recommendation.
5. Must submit an essay outlining why you need the scholarship.
6. Must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 (transcript required).
7. Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 31st annually.
8. Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. *(Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation. Two weeks notice required).*

Scholarship Selection Process:

1. Lions of Michigan Scholarship Committee will review all applications during January.
2. This scholarship will be awarded in February annually at the Michigan Forum.

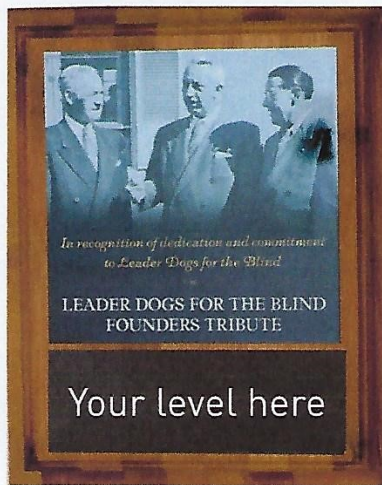

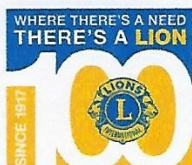
