On a personal note, the following is a little short story about my dad:

I was raised in St. Clair Shores. We enjoyed lake life; not living on the lake, but we fished a lot. That's where I was taught the patience of fishing, hoping to learn how to drive a boat.

Soon my dad retired, and my parents moved to Au Gres. The fishing was great: it was good for my dad and was good for my mom, since he was out of the house for at least 4-5 hours in the morning! At this time, I was 35 or so and had a family of my own; a great and understanding wife and three great kids.

We would go up and see them on a regular basis, and of course go fishing. Even then I would not be allowed to drive the boat. My dad fished at least six days a week, depending on the weather. My brother would visit from California, and we would meet at our folks' house. Of course, we would go fishing. Again, dad would drive the boat even with two fully grown sons on board.

As many years passed, we would make our trips up to the folks' and go fishing. I started to notice that things were changing with my dad's vision. He started to make large-dimensioned lines on the coffee

maker, as making the morning coffee was one of his "jobs." I asked my mom what was happening, and she explained that dad's vision was failing. She mentioned that they were going to the Kellogg Center for testing. Come to find out, he had macular degeneration in both eyes and was going blind, but he still wanted to drive the boat.

Even with this disability, we would go out fishing and he would still drive the boat. Sometimes weather would create a need for me to be his "eyes" while navigating. Finally, one day we were making our visits and going fishing, and he finally asked the question; "Would you like to take the wheel of the boat?" That was at the same time a moment of great excitement and of great sadness. We lost my dad in 2004, and we still miss him.

Charlotte and I both shed tears while writing this story. However, I write this not-so-short story about my dad because I see a parallel between his driving the boat and Lions chairing positions, whether they be in a club, at a region or district level, or on a state committee. Please, please, please, let's not frustrate upcoming Lion leaders by not letting them drive the boat. Chairpersons, mentor and trust the leaders working at your side to take on the leadership role and to support you.

Plus, one never knows when they may be hit by a beer truck. Seriously.

Remember the district convention is coming up and the delegate forms have to be turned in ahead of time. Here are the requirements for the delegates and alternates...

- 1. Delegates/Alternates form must be returned to the Credential Chairman by March 31, 2018.
- 2. The number of Delegates allowed per club is predicted on the total membership stated on the March 2017 MMR. It is one delegate for each 10 members or major fraction thereof.
- 3. To change an Alternate to a Delegate at the Convention, the club President or Secretary or the District Governor must be present and appear with said Alternate.
- 4. To receive voting credential, all Delegates must be registered at the Convention.
- 5. This form must be signed by **BOTH** the President and Secretary of your club.

I was looking through the MyLCI from Lions International when I noticed something. I saw a deceased member still on the roster. Please make sure you report membership correctly and in a timely fashion. International dues are dispersed to the club every January 1 and July 1. Not reporting in a timely fashion could cause the club unnecessary and additional expenses.

### **BILL GRAHAM AND** LEADER DOG GIBSON


