Mission 1.5 - Impossible?

Happy September fellow Lions! If you missed the Installation picnic and our first Cabinet meeting, you probably have not been given the skinny on Mission 1.5. Simply put, Mission 1.5 is a drive for membership by LCI (Lions Club International). Worldwide the goal is to increase membership from approximately 1.4 million to 1.5 million. Okay, fine. Increasing membership is always a goal. Why 1.5?

It is all about metrics. We are the largest service club in the world. How do we prove that? Metrics. We know how many members we have. We have metrics on how many people we serve (thanks to the clubs that report on their service). The metrics suggest that if we increase our membership to 1.5 million globally, our service will reach 1 billion annually.

We may have already reached our goal, but only reported service is recognized. This is why it is important for every club to report on at least 1 service activity. I am guessing most everyone did not know a regular meeting constitutes a service activity. Why? Because you are meeting to plan how to help someone else.

This underscores the reason why it is important to report your service online.

The solution to the membership problem offered by LCI is to sponsor more clubs. While we do have areas that could be serviced better by adding another club, GMT Shawn and I agree that strengthening our existing clubs should be top priority for our District.

The goal for Mission 1.5 for each club is simple. The challenge began when Gov Rhonda took office so the number of members in each club started there. The objective is to get to a net +3 by the end of Gov. Kimberly's year of service. Net +3 does not mean just 3 new members but rather, if you lose a member, that is counted also. If your club achieves this, you have done your job as a club. While the intention may not be to stop at this point, reaching it can foster new ideas and potentially increase membership in the future. It is not an unreachable goal for most clubs. As always, there are extenuating circumstances which might prevent some clubs from achieving this.

We have a round of regional meetings coming up this month and I encourage everyone to attend at least one of them. Dates are 9/9, 9/18, and 9/24. We can learn a lot from each other. Remember, we are planting seeds for success and success = serving more people. This is because We Serve, and You are, AWESOME and THAT'S A FACT, JACK!

Leader Dogs for the Blind - Lions Newsletter

September is Guide Dog Month!

In September, we celebrate Guide Dog Month. We take this opportunity to recognize the impact guide dogs have on our clients every day, and to celebrate all the lives that touch each guide dog even before they are matched with a client.

At Leader Dog, each Future Leader Dog is born in a host home. The volunteer breeding or whelping host supports the Leader Dog Mom through the first few weeks of puppy raising (no easy task for any mom!) and begin to expose the puppies in their care to new experiences. These early experiences help puppies develop the sense of curiosity and confidence they need as guide dogs. Around 7 weeks old, puppies spend 2 weeks on Leader's campus getting their initial vaccines and veterinary care. We recently published an article about the first 8 weeks of a Future Leader Dog's life in our volunteer magazine,

Beginning around 9 weeks old, Future Leader Dogs spend 12-14 months with volunteer puppy raisers. Some are raised by one individual, some spend 6 months in one home and 6 in another, some are raised in our Prison Puppy program, and some are raised by groups. In this year, theylearnto be greatdogs and experience as many environments as possible to continue developing their curiosity and confidence.

Lion Linda Lindeman-DeCarlo began raising puppies with Leader Dogs for the Blind about 22 years ago. Rusty, the 19th dog she raised, is working in Utah. Read the story in St George News. She says, "A lot of people say, 'How are you going to give up this puppy?' ... We're not. We're not 'giving up'. We're giving back. That's what it's all about, after all these years, the friendships I've developed." Learn more about Puppy Raisers at LeaderDog.org.





Finally, Future Leader Dogs return to Leader's campus for 4-6 months of training with a guide dog mobility instructor (GDMI). They learn how to guide, how to avoid obstacles, how to ignore distractions, when to disobey a command for safety, and all the skillsthey needto bea guide dog. Their GDMI trains them on campus, but also in the community. They go to the mall, to downtown Detroit, and to rural roads. They spend time in department stores, malls, and on public transportation. And when they aren't training, they enjoy enrichmentactivities, group playsessions, and sometimes work with the Lions team in their office.
